


Introduction handbook for international geography students during the 2023-2024 academic year

Mantsa-English dictionary

Learn to speak like local geographers!

Mantsa is the local dialect of Finnish spoken by geographers here in Helsinki. Mantsa itself is a Finnish nickname for geography deriving from the word *maantiede*, which, well, means "geography" in Finnish. Finns love to shorten their words - this is one of them! Here's a list of important words you'll need to know during your time with us in Helsinki! Some of the words have been translated into English, but some have been left in Finnish. Important words have been marked with a .

A. I. Virtanen Square (A. I. Virtasen aukio): The square between the Physicumin ja Chemicumin buildings named after Artturi Ilmari Virtanen, a Finnish chemist and Nobel laureate. He also has the honor of having a bus stop named after him, where you should get off if you take the 56 of 506 buses.

Academic quarter hour (akateeminen vartti): lectures at the University of Helsinki (almost) always start a quarter past the hour and end at a quarter till (for a duration of 90 minutes).

Active student organization member (aktiivi): a student who has voluntarily taken up a job within the geography students' organization MaO.

Alina Hall (Alina-sali): party central at the New University House (Uusi ylioppilastalo).

Anniversary party (Vuosijuhlat, shortened to "vujut"): A fancy dinner party to celebrate an anniversary, in our case MaO's anniversary in March.

Boozing (Lärvit): Enjoying alcohol

CorelDraw: one of the drawing programs used for digitizing, drawing and formatting maps.

Digitization (digitointi): a carpal tunnel inducing torture ritual. In the end you may get a shiny new digital map.

EGEA (European Geography Association for Students and Young Geographers): an international organization that brings together geography students from different cities across Europe. EGEA organizes short-term exchanges and meetups throughout the year.

Flunkyball a.k.a. flunky: legendary drinking game and fun amplifier where players form two teams compete to see who can finish their drinks first. You're welcome to participate with an alcoholic or non-alcoholic drink! An unmissable sight at all MaO's outdoor (or sometimes even indoor) events.

Gambina a.k.a. "G": Ruby-red party elixir.

Game night (peli-ilta): a chance to hang out with fellow geographers and play fun board games in a relaxed setting.

Geopiste ("geopoint"): Meeting room belonging to the Department of Geosciences. Located in the geography hall (Valopiha) in the Physicum building. Also sometimes referred to affectionately as the G-spot.

GIS, Geographic Information Sciences (geoinformatiikka): one of the trendiest topics among Helsinkian geographers, many of whom aspire to become revered GIS-wizards (gizzards?).

GIS Labs (GIS-labrat): where Gis-wizards do their magic, more specifically rooms A111-A114 in the geography hall (Valopiha). If you're lucky you may spend some long days here.

Hacky sack (bägi): a low-threshold pastime and popular sport among geography students; a sure sign of spring.

HOAS: Housing foundation for Helsinki region students. If you're lucky you may find an apartment with affordable rent, after a long waiting time (mainly applies to studio apartments).

Instagram: You can follow @maantieteenopiskelijatry and #mantsaonkivaa to get familiar with the spirit of studying geography at the University of Helsinki.

"JJE": This sound can only be described as an affirmative, celebratory grunt, but despite its primitive nature, it manages to bring geographers together and closer to their cavedwelling roots. You may hear this in a variety of situations.

K.A.R.H.U: The Lecturer of the Year will be awarded with this title at the Christmas party. The title is based on an acronym from the Finnish words: *kiinnostava, auttava, rohkaiseva, hauska ja uusia näkökulmia avaava* (in eng. interesting, helpful, encouraging, fun and giving new perspectives). Fun fact: *karhu* in Finnish means bear.

Kikki-Monkey: headgear that lets you know there's some rough partying ahead! Be prepared, you have been warned.

Kitchen: Found by the sofas. Help yourself to a nice cup of coffee or tea. But remember to wash any mugs or dishes you have used!

Kivipiha (Rock garden): The geologists' Valopiha (Light garden) (see the separate entry about this below) is located opposite Valopiha in the Physicum building. You can find the geological rock map of Finland there. KJYR: Yearly autumn student cruise to Stockholm. The name comes from an acronym from the Finnish words: Kumpulan Järjestöjen Yhteinen Risteily (in eng. Kumpula student organization's joint cruise trip). This is an epic event that you don't want to miss.

Rlusteri a.k.a. Klusse: Shared clubhouse in Kamppi used by MaO and other student organizations in the Faculty of Science. Also known as Klusse, the clubhouse hosts, pre-parties, afterparties, game nights, board meetings—you name it! Hanging out at Klusse means abiding by strict rules that apply there. Most importantly clean up after yourself and do not fall asleep there!

KOOMA: The annual gathering of Finnish geography students from different Finnish universities since 2015. Includes lectures, parties, and a table party (see the separate entry below) for example. The next meeting will be held in the spring of 2024 in Oulu! Kooma in Finnish means coma but in this case it is another acronym from the Finnish words Kokoontuvat Opiskelevat Maantieteilijät, direct translation: Gathering Student Geographers.

LG: An abbreviation of the words "löysää göysii", which means "loosen the ropes". This victory chant definitely amps up the hype! This is one of geographers' most popular sayings that you will most likely hear when playing flunky (see the separate entry above) or in a sports match with other geographers!

Mankeli: Literally the Finnish word for mangle, an old fashion contraption used for straightening sheets. In the land of Mantsa, *mankeli* is used to refer to the feeling of being *inside* the mangle - you can only imagine how it feels. It can be a feeling that is the sum of several (chaotic) things. It is mostly used when "going nuts" and the result of the action can be felt the next day. It can also be used to describe a tricky situation.

Mantsa: Finnish nickname for maantiede, which means geography in Finnish. Finns love to shorten their words - this is one of them! You may hear "mantsa" used in spoken language.

Mantu: MaO's very own not-so-academic academic journal, currently mostly written in Finnish, but submissions in any language are always more than welcome! The journal covers very advanced and very serious science, of course! You're reading the first edition of Little Mantu, the English-language spinoff of Mantu for new students.



MaO ry (Maantieteen Opiskelijat ry, lit. Students of Geography): Student organization for geography students at the University of Helsinki. The organization takes care of its members and organizes different events. Membership costs 10€ and it is lifelong, how great, right? The membership is required if you are planning to attend parties and events or enjoy affordable tea and coffee in the kitchen which is provided by MaO.

MaO's annual Cultural geography trip (KuMa-retki): Epic annual multi-day trip abroad held by MaO's trip coordinators. The trip's destination has often been one of the Baltic countries and has included both guided activities and free time to explore cities in our neighboring countries.



Mapsu: MaO's adorable, huggable, frog-shaped mascot!

May Day (Vappu): The climax of the spring semester! Finnish students celebrate this event for at least a week, or maybe even the whole year. Traditionally a holiday for students and the working class, nowadays students - young and old - gather in the streets and celebrate together and ring in the spring after a long winter.

Musta Härkä (lit. *The Black Bull*): Karaoke Bar/Nightclub located in Vallila and it is one of geographers' go-to places to party. There you have a chance to sing karaoke and eat pizza while dancing! Often offers student discounts on drinks.

Oljenkorsi: Geographers' favorite pub just a hop and a skip away from Kumpula campus!

Overalls (haalarit): As part of an iconic Nordic university tradition students in Finland and Sweden sport different colored jumpsuits or overalls at student events. Overalls are decorated with a diverse array of badges that students collect over the course of their university career. Each major has different colored overalls; geography students at the University of Helsinki have fittingly forest green overalls. Student overalls are about pure fun, but they come with a few rules. For example, they can never be washed and all the patches must be sewn on by the owner of the overalls themselves!

Parmesan: A pizzeria down the street from Kumpula campus.

Pisang Ambon: This drink has the color and taste of a real banana. Surprisingly good!

Pre-Christmas party (Pikkujoulut): Following the Nordic tradition of hosting Christmas parties in the weeks coming up to Christmas, our first-year geography students organize a wintry bash in the Alina-hall. Keep your eyes peeled for a stolen Christmas tree!

Reippailijat: MaO's sports association Reippailijat hosts weekly sports sessions, which cost around 2 euros per session (the volleyball session is free!). You can check out the sessions and sign up for them (by giving a specific post a like) on the "MaO:n liikuntainfo" Facebook group. Reippailijat translates to "the diligent or spirited ones". Anyone is welcome to become a reippailija!

Shrove Tuesday (Laskiainen): Although originally a religious holiday, in Finland Shrove Tuesday is a winter celebration spent sledding and having fun. Every year a crazy downhill sledding race takes place in Kaivopuisto. Geographers and other students come to watch, hang out, and enjoy hot chocolate and a delicious shrove bun with creme filling. Shrove buns come traditionally with either berry jam or marzipan filling.

Silliaamiainen, "Sillis" (lit. Herring Breakfast): A breakfast with herring and drinks (usually sparkling wine) traditionally served the day after a table party (see the separate entry below). P.S. nowadays herring is usually replaced with other food.

Suppa (lit. kettle hole): The shared club room of geographers and geologists, which is located in the Rock garden in Physicum. You can study here or even reserve the room for meetings.

Table party or "sit sit" (sitsit): An iconic academic tradition where students gather to enjoy a dinner,

during which traditional student songs are sung alongside other activities, such as making speeches. If you like, you can buy your very own songbook from MaO! Songbooks are passed around and all attendees write fun messages to each other and bond over the shared memory of the night. Many people cherish their songbooks throughout and even after their studies!

The Department of Geosciences and Geography (Geotieteiden ja maantieteen osasto): An entity of the University of Helsinki bringing together geographers and geologists.

The Finnish Geographical Society (Suomen Maantieteellinen Seura): Publishes two journals, Terra and Fennia.

The sofas (sohvat): The geographers' meeting spot and the best place to hang out in Physicum, Kumpula campus. You can get cheap coffee and tea from the kitchen. Welcome!

Think Corner (Tiedekulma): Think Corner is your one-stop-shop for all your studying, chilling, or even weight-lifting needs! Completed in 2017, Think Corner is an architectural gem located on the Center Campus across from the Porthania building. It houses numerous studying and meeting spots and an expansive Unisport gym in the basement floors. Think Corner often hosts riveting academic discussions and events.

Toto - Africa: The geographers' anthem. Adding this to the queue is sure to make you popular.

Trivia (visat, visailu): An excellent way to spend time at the sofas and postpone all the important stuff. MaO holds a Trivia night once in a while. Trivia night is an all-English event for local and exchange students alike!

Tutor (tuutori): Your trustworthy guide to academic life, student culture, and anything you may need during your time in Helsinki!

Valopiha (Light Garden): Geographers' corridor that has high ceilings and lots of natural light (of course)! You can find our cozy sofas, our plentiful kitchen, and lots of friends! The best and coziest place in Physicum, at least in our opinion!



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Helpful Apps

Facebook: We recommend you to join MaO's facebook group (it's called MaO ry), so you can easily keep up with the events. Event info will also be posted on the mail list (mao-lista@helsinki.fi). You can check out and sign up for MaO's weekly sports sessions by joining a Facebook group called "MaO:n liikuntainfo".

Foodora: A mobile app and online platform that offers food delivery!

Frank App: Offers an official student card and a lot of student benefits. You can get special student discounts from restaurants, shops and bars for example. Show your student card on this app when buying lunch at Unicafe.

HSL: Helsinki Regional Transport Authority. You can buy tickets, check timetables, use a journey planner (similar to Google Maps) and get travel information from the HSL app (you should definitely download this!). The student discounted monthly ticket is only available on the app.

Kide App: Check this app or webpage if you want to buy tickets to a student event!

Lidl Plus: Get discounts while you shop at Lidl grocery stores.

Matkahuolto: Postal delivery company. You can also find information about public transport timetables across Finland.

MobilePay: Finland's most popular (and free) mobile payment app. You should download this app, in case you want to buy some beverages from MaO's parties!

Outlook: Mostly used to send and receive emails. You get your own username from the University of Helsinki.

Posti: Mobile app for the Finnish national postal service. Track your packages and receive notifications of incoming orders here.

ResQ: You can buy affordable food and decrease food waste by rescuing portions from restaurants, cafés and grocery stores using this app.

Telegram: Free instant messaging service that offers the option to message without using a phone number.

Tise: A mobile marketplace for second-hand clothes and furnishings.

Tori: The largest marketplace for second-hand goods in Finland. You can buy/sell pretty much everything on this webpage. Finns like to reuse (and recycle) things!

VR: The Finnish state railway company and only long distance rail operator in Finland. VR has a webpage, but we recommend you download the VR matkalla -app, so you can easily buy train tickets and check timetables.

WhatsApp: A free instant messaging app available on both Android and iPhone. Basically everyone has this app in Finland.

Wolt: A Finnish start-up and mobile app that offers food delivery! Great way to discover restaurants in your area.

Grocery stores

In Finland, grocery stores are split into different larger corporations. The most common grocery store chains are K-group, S-group and Lidl. You'll find everything you need from all the grocery stores, but stores belonging to the same chain will have the same brands and products. Hypermarkets K-Citymarket and Prisma (S-group) sell a wide variety of other items besides food.

K-markets (in order from smallest to biggest: K-Market, K-Supermarket, K-Citymarket): Usually more expensive than Lidl or S-markets but may have a more diverse array of specialty products.

S-markets (in order from smallest to biggest: Alepa, S-Market, Prisma): Usually cheaper than K-stores but a bit more expensive than Lidl.

Lidl: Probably the cheapest grocery store chain in Finland. You can install the Lidl Plus app if you want to check out their offers!

R-kioski: Very small (and expensive) convenience stores. You can find these near pretty much every train station. Good place to buy last-minute snacks.

- Some of the stores are open 24/7. You can check out the opening hours from Google maps.
- In S-group stores, you can buy discounted food items that are approaching their expiry date. After 9 pm, the discount goes up to 60%!
- Remember to bring your own bags with you as bags need to be purchased separately!
